From The Editor



The accusation that the media is creating fake news is not a new one. History shows us this accusation—and the muzzling of the media—often comes into play as a country prepares for war.

It might not be so in this case. I hope not. None-the-less, the effect is the same: to create destabilization and uncertainty in a world already teetering and fearful.

Those who accuse the media of bias want to move their people away from thinking with their brains to thinking with their fears and emotions. What's going to happen? Who do we

trust? What can we do? What's going to happen to my family? To me? Who's going to do something? Who's going to save us?

Where Are The Heroes?

It's a real question. The world today needs heroes and heroines more than ever. Yes, we need them in real flesh and blood, standing in the spotlight in the middle of chaos. But we also need them in our hands. Between the covers of our books. Inside our e-readers. We need their quiet, certain voices speaking through audio books and podcasts.

Where are the heroes?

Right here. You and me.

As writers of real fiction it's our job to take this chaotic and often volatile life and help it make sense. It's our job to give hope. To join the dots. To explain the unexplainable. To show how to love without fear, to trust in spite of past hurt and injury.

In our worlds, good triumphs over evil. The heroine discovers her inner truth and power. The hero discovers he's stronger with the woman he loves than he is on his own. Together, they forge through disaster and despair. The villain is vanquished. The heroes triumph. They deserve their happy ending.

As the world continues to reel under the effects of instability and uncertainty, as the thunderheads of international politics boil, darken, and draw closer, as friends begin to doubt their friendships, and as countries—and even families—start to loosen ties, we need to make a decision.

We can do very little about how the international media is perceived or what will happen next on this increasingly unstable planet. But we have complete control over what happens inside the pages of our books. Yes, let's write a gut-wrenching story. But in the end, to be true to our readers and the desperate need of their hearts and spirits, we have to provide what they're not finding in the real world—an ending where there is optimism for the future.

Write your next book. Get it out there. Be a hero. Give the world some hope.

That First Page

Daphne Clair



We all know how very important that first page is for our story. Many readers will scan the first paragraph, then either put the book down or read the rest of the page, perhaps two, and then decide if they really want to buy, borrow or read on.

The first page must establish the setting, introduce at least one lead character, and promise to hold the readers' attention for the rest of the book. And you have at most about two hundred and fifty words to do that.

Editors are overworked and overfamiliar with opening pages. They know all the clichés and commonest mistakes. The heroine looking critically in a mirror, or boarding or disembarking a plane; bumping into the hero and dropping her papers, purse, whatever, or almost getting run over by a subsequently furious hero; found gossiping to a colleague about the new boss's reputation for ruthless business practices and/or sexual conquests just as the hero enters, are likely to cause a sinking sensation within any experienced editor, and possibly with avid romance readers. Also, long sentences like that last one may have an off-putting effect if they appear so early.

Nothing is intrinsically wrong with these openings, but canny authors will avoid them, as they will (generally) mistaken identity, or opening pages showing boorish heroes and hapless heroines.

Dialogue looks inviting on the page, and plenty of white space is conducive to turning to page two. Keep up the pace and your editor or reader may read past page three, which for many editors is their decisive moment. But that dialogue and the surrounding words must draw them into the story.

"You write so beautifully—the inside of your mind must be a terrible place." — Anonymous No problem, huh? Flash fiction writers tell entire stories in that many words. (NB: If you haven't tried it, flash fiction is a great way to practise economy with words.)

Make your dialogue sparkle. Make it interesting. And don't waste words on small-talk that has no bearing on the story.

If dialogue isn't right for your first page, at least get some in before the end of page three, and those three pages had better be riveting stuff. Think action, not a hunk of backstory or reminiscence. Not your heroine angsting over finding her boyfriend with another woman, or pondering about her imminent meeting with the Lord of the Manor or the CEO of his own multimillion enterprise.

You have, unless it's a novella, at least 50,000 words in which to tell the editor or reader all they need to know about the past. You can convey a lot with a little action, some dialogue, a sentence or two referring to what

happened when, perhaps obliquely.

Using brief thoughts, subtle hints, description of body language or emotion, one or two brief thoughts, can give the reader hints of drama past and future, and keep her reading to find out more.

The first page may raise questions. The answers can come later, when the reader has come to know and care about the characters.

From the President

Hope you all had a great Christmas and New Year, and managed to find some decent summer weather. It's been a busy period for us on the Executive, with some big (and exciting) projects, like the new website. As there's a lot going on, any important updates that occur between this and the next issue of Heart to Heart, we'll communicate to members by email and via our member-only Facebook group and email loop.

Conference: We had a great response to our survey, and you chose Rotorua as a venue by a two-to-one margin! The 2017 RWNZ Conference will now be held at the Novotel Lakeside Rotorua, 18-20 August. Thanks to the Wellington Committee, it's a great line-up, and the overseas speakers are all excited to be coming to Roto-rua. Three members of the Wellington Committee have formally resigned and we thank them for their hard work in developing the exceptional programme. Three others have stayed on, and as I write, we are talking with other members interested in taking part in the new Committee. We're aiming to open Earlybird registrations by 1st March, so stay tuned for that announcement.

New website: This is a huge job that's involving everyone on the Executive—creating the functional spec document, selecting a developer who can do what we need for a price we can afford, supplying content, project managing, etc. Our grateful thanks to Gracie O'Neil and her husband, Jem, for keeping our old site going. We know they'll be relieved when the new one's up, because it will be so much better-looking and easier to use, with loads more functionality. Development has started, and we're aiming to have the first stage of the new website up by 1st March. This means in time for two big events, our Conference Earlybird registrations, and the opening of entries into Pacific Hearts. Timing is tight, as it always is with web projects, but all going well, we'd like to give you a preview late February. We'll keep you posted.

Charitable status and tax update: Last year, we sent out an email explaining in detail why we were applying for charitable status. In brief, when the new Charities Act became law in 2012, all organisations with tax-exempt charitable status had to re-apply. RWNZ did not do so and as a result lost its status. When we lost it, we then became liable for filing tax returns and paying tax on any income outside of our membership subscriptionsfor example, income from Conferences, contests etc. However, for whatever reason, this was not picked up by previous Executives or external accountants, and RWNZ has not been filing returns. To fix this issue, we first re-applied for charitable status, but were refused. We were given clear reasons why, and we believe we can make those changes and re-apply. But in the meantime, we've had to file tax returns and pay outstanding tax for the years 2014 and 2015 (not 2013 as we made a loss).

It's possible that the IRD may charge us late-filing and overdue tax penalties, although at the time of writing, we have not heard. To ensure RWNZ meets its tax obligations in the future, we'll make sure the Treasurer's howto guide has all the information they'll need.

Conference hotel prices: The 2018 Conference Committee has been looking at securing hotels in Auckland. Because demand is so high, many of the hotels we've used before—such as the Waipuna—have raised their costs significantly. We believe we may need to look at doing a multi-year deal with one of the chains, e.g. Accor Group. This doesn't mean being in the same hotel every year, as the chains have hotels in many locations. But it does mean we get security around pricing, which then means we can be sure we can actually afford to hold Conference. RW Australia has a hotel chain deal, for exactly that reason. We will investigate and let you know.

Strategic plan: A plan based on what members want was the foundation of our platform when we stood for Executive. A strategic plan is a living, evolving document, not something set in stone, but it should always put members' needs first. We're in the process of drafting up the first cut, and we're aiming to share it with you in mid-late February.

Executive Committee Position Available - Treasurer

Unfortunately, when she took on the role she hadn't imagined adding a full time job to the mix. But life happens to all of us. We miss her already, but wish her well in her exciting new venture—teaching economics to teenagers.

During her tenure Karen has moved the RWNZ finances away from the complex MYOB accounting program to the far simpler program, Xero. She's not only set Xero up so everything works beautifully, but she's also written an easy "How To" guide so that future treasurers can hit the ground running. In addition, she's sorted out the tax situation of the past five years and put in place much needed financial and expenses policies—which the Executive will bring to members as remits at the next AGM. As an organization, we are in a stronger position because of her hard work and dedication. Thank you, Karen. You're an angel.

Now we need to fill her shoes.

The Treasurer is a vital member of the RWNZ Exec, so it's important that—if possible—we recruit from within our membership. If you are interested in stepping up and joining the Executive Committee as Treasurer—especially if you have any previous experience with Xero—here's your chance to contribute to the organization.

If you're not sure what the Treasurer does, here's a cheat sheet from the Constitution.

7.5.6 Treasurer's Duties. The Treasurer shall:

7.5.6.1 Ensure all monies received are receipted and banked;

7.5.6.2 Ensure all accounts are paid by the due date;7.5.6.3 Keep annual cash book or computerised accounts showing adequate record of financial transactions to enable a clear statement of RWNZ's financial position

to be determined at any time;

7.5.6.4 Ensure that the financial statements are ready for review at the end of the financial year;

7.5.6.5 Present a financial statement at Executive meetings;

7.5.6.6 Present a reviewed set of financial statements at the Annual General Meeting;

7.5.6.7 Keep an asset register; and

7.5.6.8 Fulfil any other obligations required by the Executive.

If you're interested in the position but you're worried that your experience with Xero might not be adequate, don't let that put you off. Bron knows her way around Xero and will be available to talk you through any problems.

It's important for you all as members to know that if we don't have any volunteers by the end of February we'll have to outsource the function. This means paying for it.
