What's happening in RWNZ?

At the beginning of July last year, a past president bravely stuck her neck out—as she put it—and that act of speaking out brought about fruitful discussion and a reality check.

Well, it's time for another reality check, and this time I'm putting my neck on the chopping block. Before going further, I would like to clarify this is due to us being a rapidly growing organisation and change is needed.

For years, each president has strived to do their best and promote excellence in writing. It's what RWNZ stands for. Of late, it is becoming more difficult to achieve this with the way RWNZ has been set up. What we have failed to account for is, over the years, the organisation has grown and with it the workload. We are not as big as RWA, but the work that volunteers put into our organisation is still substantial.

RWNZ may have been a group that met at someone's home once, but we've grown. We now have overseas members and NYT best selling authors, which shows our success, although I am not sure what the key performance indicators for a successful romance organisation are.

We have a reputation for being an organisation that cares. International speakers enjoy coming to our conferences due to the reputation we have built over the years through work put in by various past presidents and committees.

A brief survey has shown that each person spends anywhere from 10-15 hours per month doing RWNZ work. This can be anyone; the treasurer, one of the editors of the newsletter, the publicity officer, contests' co-ordinator, membership secretary or any of the other jobs.

Our constitution and rules may have worked for an organisation that met at someone's home. But we

need an overhaul. We

haven't reached the point RWA has reached, but we do need to look at compensation for the work done, and we do need to look at revenue generating opportunities and growth of the organization, so we can offset the costs and ensure we break even.

It is time to look at the future and look at how RWNZ can strive for that balance. How do we keep our core values in promoting excellence in writing while giving the best to the members and acknowledging the work that people do? We have to ask, what's the best way to promote excellence in writing, and what's the most cost effective way of doing this?

As someone who comes from an environment that focuses on quality care while maintaining profit and cost cutting ventures, I know this can be easily achieved as long as members are open to new ideas.

I see this as an exciting time for the future of RWNZ, and so it is with great pleasure the executive ask for nominations for the executive committee of 2016.

President

Tasks:

- Serve as the Chief Executive Officer of RWNZ.
- Serve as spokesperson in regard to established policy.
- Call, set the agenda for, and preside over all meetings of the Executive Committee and meetings of the membership.
- Appoint, with Executive approval, such committees as may be needed or provided for in the Rules and the chairpersons of such committees.
- Serve as ex-officio member of all committees.
- Appoint, with the approval of the Executive, non voting office holders.
- Execute RWNZ business as specified by the Executive Committee and established policy including, but not limited to, the expenditure of RWNZ funds in accordance with the annual budget approved by the Executive.
- Open and close all bank accounts in conjunction with the Treasurer and Secretary.
- Act as cheque signatory.
- Co-ordinate all activities.
- Attend Executive meetings (in person, via phone or the internet).

Fulfil any other obligations designated by the Executive.

Vice President

Tasks:

- Preside over all meetings of the Executive in the absence of the President.
- Assume the duties of the President in the event the President is temporarily incapacitated or otherwise unable to perform.
- Act as Chapter liaison and assume other duties to be decided upon in consultation with the rest of the Executive at the beginning of the term until such time as required to assume the duties of the President
- Attend Executive meetings (in person, via phone or the internet).

Treasurer

Tasks:

The bell rings, and I'm out of time.

The First Draft

Q. How do you eat an elephant?

A. "One bite at a time"

I'm sure many of you will be familiar with this analogy. The same applies to writing...

Q. How do you write a novel?

A. One word at a time of course!

Yet when faced with writing a novel of my own, I constantly came up with lame excuses about my lack of progress. Lack of progress; after a superb session with a professional book coach who helped me to scope out the entire plot outline, and timeline characters and scenes for the story.

All I had to do was fill the pages with words and *get it* done.

Easy... right? Not so much. Work, relationships, pets, fitness, family, celebration, tragedy and life kept offering up the most colourful distractions. Writing just felt too big, too scary, too hard and too unachievable. The finish line was too far away.

A bit like that blasted elephant. There's just too much of it, and there's no way I could eat it in just one sitting.

I would give my mentor a barrage of excuses each time we skyped, finally concluding with the dramatic, hand on forehead clincher, "I simply cannot do this. I need to give up my day job to have a serious crack at writing, and that's not happening any time soon."

After a moment's silence, she came back with, "But you've got holidays owing right?"

"Yes," I replied, wondering where she was going with this one.

"Well, why not take two weeks off work and just write? Just get it done." Wise words from a wise woman indeed.

"I can't possibly take two weeks off just for me... I need to spend my holidays with my husband." Did I? Now, that was food for thought.

A week later we skyped again, and I proudly announced I'd booked in a week of annual leave.



Interestingly, my husband was extremely supportive. He saw it as a win-win; I would get the time and headspace to truly focus, he wouldn't have to put up with me bemoaning that I need to win lotto, so I can quit my day job to be a fulltime writer!

Taking some of my holidays off to write was the best thing I could have done. I now understand why writer's retreats are so popular. I gave myself permission to spend nine glorious days immersed in my story, and it was fantastic.

But procrastination is a trap for newbies. The week sprawled out ahead of me, and I thought I had plenty of time. By day three, I realised I needed to get my A into G as time stands still for nobody.

So I split the remaining days into chunks, ensuring I had time to walk the dogs, shower, lunches, tea breaks and write. At least five hours of solid, no *BS* writing each day. Not blogging, not tweeting, just writing my book. The results were amazing. Instead of seeing my novel as that enormous elephant with no clear end in sight, I broke it down into a daily work target and stuck to it. In nine days, I managed to finish thirteen chapters.

Feeling like a mother hen, I watched the pages of my first ever draft come off the printer, double spaced on A4 pages, and realised... I DID IT. I did what so many people talk about doing and never actually do, I wrote a whole book. Sure, the fun and games of getting my draft ready to publish was still ahead of me, with absolutely no guarantee that I'd ever sell a copy, but in the moment of finishing my first draft none of that mattered.

I had written a story, developed a plot, created characters and let them come to life through my words. Sure, my characters are a whole bunch of crazies. But they're my crazies. I've discovered the magic of writing.



This 7-Minute Morning Routine Will Change Your (Work) Life

This routine takes seven minutes each morning before you start work. Will you follow it?

It only takes seven minutes to change how you approach your day. Using the routine described below when you get to work will make a world of difference in your productivity, your attitude, your success, and your health. It's like the approach you make to the tee on a golf course. You plan out how you will hit the shot, which is more important than the actual swing. Before you start your day, it provides the right mindset. Will you follow it?

Note: I'm going to call this routine "the seven" as indid you do your seven this morning? Feel free to borrow that term or send me ideas on a better name.

1. Before you start: Prepare

First, you need to find a quiet place. Hint for those who work in a cubicle farm, this is not at your desk. And it's not in the car because there are too many distractions. At a busy startup, it might be a foyer or a balcony. You might have to arrive early enough in the morning to make this work. You'll also need a journal. Make sure you have one and that you have a pen. Also, wear a watch. You will want to time yourself and finish up within seven minutes.

2. Minute one: Clear your head

I won't get into any religious issues or get preachy here, and I'm not even encouraging meditation, but every person on the planet who has to work for a living needs to follow this basic routine. You have to clear your head. That phone you use to check your messages constantly or that iPad that's stuck to your hip. Get rid of them. They are not part of this morning routine. Clearing your head just means being present as you prepare for the day.



3. Minute two: Breathe a little

Again, you may have a different way of dealing with the stress you will feel in life. However, breathing deeply creates a calming effect in your brain and helps you focus. Intentional breathing is important at all times of the day. For this routine to work, you have to stop and settle your thinking and get into the right frame of mind. Just sit quietly and breathe.

4. Minutes three through six: Write notes and draw

You've heard all about journaling, but the process I use is not just journaling. I write in a journal all day, right after I get up in the morning and have coffee, at night before bed, and during meetings and at conferences. I'm not just talking about journaling. I'm talking about writing down the first few thoughts you have before you start work but when you are already at work. Draw a picture or doodle an idea. It's a way to figure out what is important, what is stressing you out. It is a record of your preparation and a way to help you look back and see, for these seven minutes, what was really important. Make sure you don't get too focused on the writing and not enough on the thinking.


5. Minute seven: Debrief

After you write a few notes, keep track of the time and make sure you allow about one minute at the end to debrief. What does that mean? Just look over your notes a second time. Think about what you wrote and why, and make a brief plan-in only 30 seconds-to act on one of the items on your list. Just one. If you jotted down a note to deal with a conflict or to finish a report, decide to focus on that task, and make sure you are intentional about addressing it.

That's it. Seven minutes. I'm really interested to find out if you use this routine in the morning before you start working. Follow the plan for at least one week. Then, send me a note about what you learned and how it all worked out. I promise to respond.

Rosalind was looking for beachy/feel-good romances set in either New Zealand or Australia because she saw real interest from Americans in this part of the world. She proposed we called the set 'Love Down Under'.

Okay, so that was Rosalind, H.Y., Serenity and me. Who else down here held the rights to a suitable book? Diana Fraser had a beauty set on Waiheke Island. Yep. Tracey Alvarez specialises in beachy stories. Yep. Joanne Hill had an excellent one, and by chance she'd done the Heart to Heart interview with Rosalind, so that was a nice coincidence. It didn't hurt that we five had combined forces on our 'Second Chances' boxed set last year and knew we could get on well together. I'd

enjoyed working with Annie Seaton on her 'Sun, Sand and Sizzle' holiday collection a few months ago, and I thought she might be interested too. She immediately decided to write a new novella. (She's fast!) And so we had our eight.

I have to say it's been pure joy cooperating. Rosalind has been in the driving seat, but this has fallen together beautifully because we all have different talents and different fan-bases.

How did the world get on without email? H.Y. took off to Dubai on family business for a while and never missed a beat. Rosalind in the USA, Annie in Australia, and the rest of us in New Zealand kept in constant touch, proposing cover photos, promotional ideas, everything you can imagine. We jointly created a publicity kit (my first experience with Google Docs). Those who are Facebook experts will be doing their thing, those who have influence with iBooks are persuading store banners etc. out of contacts there, and I'm writing this little item amongst various bits and bobs. Diana has taken on the daunting job of formatting the whole set, and Tracey is proving to be a promo demon.

Annie found the wonderful photo (which we refer to as 'sexy-back'). Rosalind sent it to her cover designer, and we didn't believe our luck when we saw the finished results. Amazon will display the 3D version with the reflection, and iBooks requires the flat one. By the time you read this, it will have been out for around a week, and we're hoping we can launch with a hundred reviews from our combined newsletter subscribers. Please feel free to add a review to that total.

And do buy a copy. It'll be a steal for 99 cents US. Obviously, we're hoping for recognition rather than riches because 99 cents will bring us 35 cents royalty for each sale, and once we've split that eight ways we'll make less than four and a half cents. We may, or may not, make enough to cover the cost of the planned publicity. (But a little bird keeps telling me if we sell half a million that would be two thousand buckos each).

Okay, I'm dreaming! But it'll be worth it for the experience alone.
